Educational Benefits

Students can observe the perennial blooms throughout the year. French Lace Weigela produces deep pink flowers that emerge in early spring. Coreopsis blooms all throughout the summer and produces sunny yellow daisylike flower. Moonshadow Euonymous features shiny yellow evergreen leaves that maintain their color all year long. Coreopsis and Weigela are also great plants to attract butterflies.

Beautification

There are many great advantages to planting perennials. The Arlington Primary planters feature perennials that add a backsplash of color to 'hardscapes' such as walls and chainlink fences. Perennials are also relatively easy to maintain. And once they become well-established, perennials will continue to produce flowers year in and year out.
