Green Profile: Classical (6-8)

At Classical (6-8), yellow wood and London plane trees line the driveway leading up to the school's entrance. As these trees grow fuller, they will provide a shady, welcoming entrance for the school community and visitors alike.

Two types of perennial shrubs adorn the slope adjacent to Classical's main entrance: *Mountain laurels* produce Pennsylvania's state flower, a beautiful pink and white blossom that lasts from late May into June.

Rhododendrons are hardy shrubs. Some varieties can grow as tall as 20 feet!

Number of plants planted: 17 Trees

- 40 Shrubs
- 30 Perennials

Educational Benefits

The flowers of the mountain laurel and rhododendron shrubs attract a variety of birds, butterflies and other species. Teachers can use these shrubs to teach science lessons about species identification and habitats.

Beautification

By the main entrance, where there was previously dirt and thinning grass, now stands a flourishing katsura tree encircled with boxwood shrubs and natural boulders. Though the green space is small, this touch of nature significantly brightens the entryway, creating a cheerful and inviting atmosphere.





Environmental Benefits

The 17 trees planted at Classical are currently 2" in diameter. If they are well cared for and grow to 8", they have the potential (per year) to:

Absorb 11,898 gallons of storm water runoff

Conserve 635 kilowatt hours of electricity by cooling the building

Reduce atmospheric carbon by 3,214 pounds
